

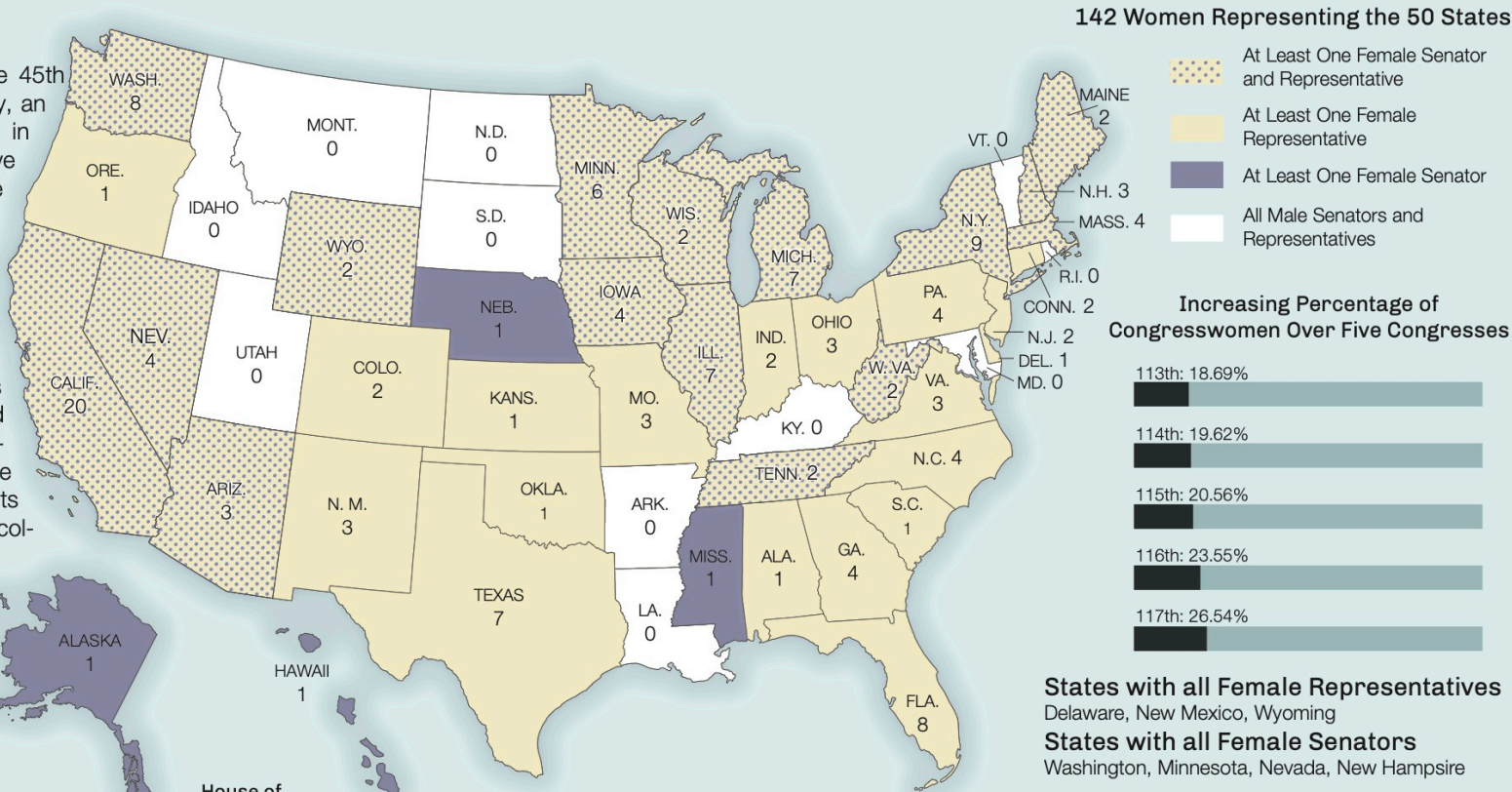
# Female Representation in the United States Federal Government

## The 117th Congress

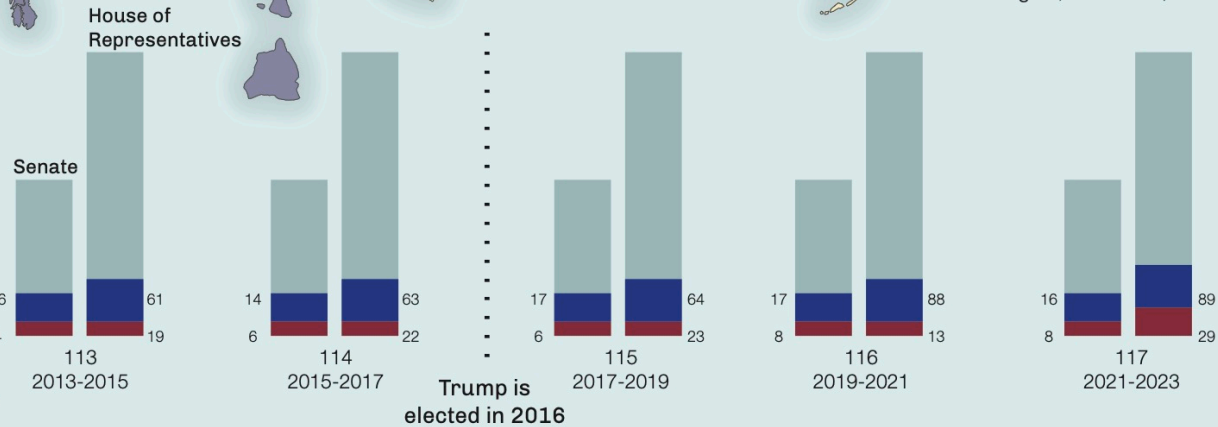
In 2017, Donald Trump was inaugurated as the 45th president of the United States. The following day, an estimated 4.1 million people globally marched in opposition with a vow to elect more representative governments that would respect and protect the rights of all female identifying individuals. Since then the most diverse Congresses in the United States' history have been elected, with more women serving than ever before.

It is critical that women have representation in government. They provide unique insight from their individual and collective experiences with gender roles and oppression. Female elected officials have the power to address the discrimination they face through the political system. They are also far more likely to advocate for equal rights regardless of their political party than their male colleagues. As a result, having a greater proportion of women in government benefits everyone.

Since Trump's election, thirty-seven more women have been elected into the United States federal Congress. In January 2021, sixteen of those women were sworn into their first term, the largest increase since 1993.
